COURSE RULES

1. Lectures take place on Thursdays, 16:45 PM in person in room B at the FoES and simultaneously in the form of videoconferences. Links and materials are provided on the course page on the moodle platform. Presence during lectures is recommended. Persons who do not attend lectures neither in person nor on-line are required to use the provided materials and acquaint themselves with the covered topics on their own.
2. Tutorials take place on Wednesdays. Students are required to attend in person at the FoES, apart from those who have an individual permission from the Dean (and who participate in the form of videoconferences). Participation in classes is mandatory, a student may have at most two unjustified absences during the semester. In case of justified absences other than those confirmed by a medical sick leave (for example, in cases when someone is put in quarantine), the student is required to contact the teacher and determine an alternative way of participation (before classes or immediately when the obstacles occur). If the student exceeds the limit of unjustified absences, does not establish alternative participation rules for absences or does not abide by the established rules, he/she fails the subject (fails classes and does not have the right to take the exam neither in the first nor in the second term).
3. Courses in moodle are an integral part of classes, mandatory for all students (separately for the lecture and for all the tutorials). The tutorial groups in moodle are coordinated by the class tutors.
4. Class grades are awarded based on the outcomes of two tests, which are held in person (apart from those students who have an individual permission from the Dean, for whom the tests are oral or online, as established by the class tutor), team activity during classes and individual activity in moodle. Each test is worth max 30 points and may be corrected (exactly once, before the resit session). Team activity (worth max 30p) nor individual moodle activity (worth max 10p) may not be corrected. In order to receive a passing grade from classes, a student must obtain at least 50 points in total. In justified cases, the class tutor may raise the class grade based on individual activity during classes.
5. The class teacher will divide students from each class into teams and will assign problems to solve to each team before each class. Each team is required to jointly prepare and present the solution to their problems during classes. Not preparing a presentation of the solution or not presenting it leads to a zero mark for the specific activity for each team member.
6. Links to series of problems for classes and series of homework problems will be posted on the webpage www.wne.uw.edu.pl/ajanicka and on the course pages in moodle. The solutions to homework assignments should be uploaded to a location specified by the class teacher on the moodle course page, by the date specified. Each homework assignment may be corrected exactly once, within a deadline specified by the class tutor.
7. Mandatory moodle activities (short tests) will be posted on the moodle course page. A student receives 1 point for each activity completed (max 10 points for 10 activities during the semester, which count for the class grade as specified in pt 4 above).
8. All students who pass classes are entitled to participate in the final exam.
9. The final grade for the subject will be based on the sum of points: for homework assignments (rescaled to the range 0-10 points), class points as per pt 4. above (rescaled to the range of 0-40 points) and final exam (rescaled to the range of 0-50 points). In order to obtain a passing final grade, a student must obtain at least 50 points overall.

10. The final exam will be held in person. The exact form of the exam will be specified at a later stage, but regardless of the form the exam will consist of solving problems.
11. Students who repeat the course must repeat classes.
12. In case of changes of the Rector's or Dean's regulations, the form of the course may become online. In such a case, the form of tests and the final exam may be changed (to online or oral) and the lecture and tutorials may take the form of videoconferences. All other elements of the course rules remain unchanged.
